### Letter from our Executive Director

Dear Community,

For so long, 2024 had been a highly anticipated year. A critical year on the horizon to win change for our communities. Now as the year comes to a close, we are reflecting on wins, losses, and learnings as we prepare for how to move forward.

This year, our focus was reaching voters about the crucial elections that took place. Knowing that voters can face so many barriers to casting their votes – including a lack of information or a barrage of misleading ads – we wanted to make it as easy as possible for voters of color and working-class voters to not only vote, but also get the real facts about the propositions.

That's why we created and distributed a voter guide, with endorsements for 25 local and state ballot measures. We also hired a paid team of canvassers and trained dozens of volunteers to go out and talk to voters, because **we believe that grassroots** organizing is the best way to make a positive impact in elections.

While we're excited for you to read through this impact report to celebrate several wins with us, we also faced many sobering losses like the defeat of Proposition 5, which would've helped build more affordable housing and the passage of Proposition 36, which will cut \$750 million of funding from programs that support crime prevention and drug treatment, disproportionately impacting low-income communities of color. We're already strategizing on how we can ensure voters turn out and vote in favor of measures that uplift working-class communities and communities of color in the future.

The highly awaited 2024 may be over but I'm not going to sugarcoat it. It's going to take all of us next year to protect our communities from the anti-immigrant, anti-trans, and xenophobic policies of the incoming presidential administration.

We're going to need your help. Please join us by <u>donating to SF Rising</u>, <u>signing up to be a volunteer</u>, or <u>staying in the loop</u> <u>with our efforts</u>.

- **862** ballot measure voter guides distributed

### **About SF Rising**

#### Our Mission

San Francisco Rising builds the political power of working-class communities and communities of color in San Francisco to lead the way for a government that centers racial, economic and environmental justice. We are an alliance of grassroots organizations led by people of color, and a political home for San Franciscans who care about justice and sustainability. We build power through deepening multiracial solidarity, educating and mobilizing voters, working closely with policy makers, organizing, and developing leaders of color.

#### Our Impact

Win political representation and lasting political power of SF working-class people and communities of color.

Be a political home for San Franciscans fighting for racial, economic, and environmental justice.

Win policies that do right by communities of color and working families, replacing lip service and token acts.

Practice co-governance that brings community leaders & elected officials together to move an agenda that advances equity, justice, & sustainability.

#### **History & Theory of Change**

SF Rising was founded in 2009 by a group of organizers from long-standing community organizations that realized San Francisco city government was not working in the interest of its communities – particularly low-income communities, immigrant communities, and communities of color. By tapping and supporting those in communities often labeled as 'unlikely' or 'moderately-likely voters' by traditional campaigns, we believe they can have an impact on city legislation and leadership.



# SF Rising Alliance Organizations

SF Rising's alliance organizations are community-embedded organizations around San Francisco that provide basic services, put on events, and organize their communities. Because the alliance meets frequently, alliance members have the opportunity to hear what is going on in other communities around the city and support and organize together for collective change.















### Key Programs

#### Voter outreach

SF Rising was proud to engage voters during the 2024 election year. We prioritized registering voters, sharing our voter guide, and talking to voters about propositions so they could make informed decisions.

We registered voters at several locations and events throughout the year. We partnered with Mission Hiring Hall on National Voter Registration Day, as well as other organizations throughout the year, such as Salōn and Sunday Streets!

For the November General Election, we put together a voter guide with our endorsements on 25 local and statewide ballot measures. We **distributed 800+ voter guides** to community members across San Francisco!

Our priorities were passing statewide Proposition 5, which would have made it easier to create more affordable housing and defeating Proposition 36, which will make mass incarceration worse and cut funding for programs that keep us safe. We worked alongside Power California Action, a statewide coalition that we're a part of, to engage young voters about these measures.

Even though the result of these measures didn't go the way we hoped, our 6 paid canvassers and 40 volunteers **reached over 4,000 voters** by knocking on over 2,000 doors and making over 17,000 phone calls!

This was the first time phonebanking and doorknocking for many of our volunteers, we were excited to help build the skills they need to organize more in the future. The people power we built this year will keep growing beyond the election.









### Key Programs

#### **Student Organizing**

SF Rising began organizing with college students across the Bay Area in 2017. We engage students by registering them to vote, tabling at campus events, and through grassroots organizing. Now, we have a growing base of student organizers who organize young people around issues like affordable housing and community safety.

We support student organizers by building up their foundational organizing skills and exploring ways to address the issues impacting their communities. Every year, SF Rising holds a Student Power Fellowship, which focuses on creating space for working-class, queer, Black, Indigenous, and other students of color to lead and build community with other college students from across the Bay Area.

This year, our **6 Student Power Fellows** learned about the political landscape of San Francisco, went through leadership workshops, and canvassed and phonebanked to connect with community members to understand their concerns ahead of the 2024 Election.

We are proud to help amplify youth voices and equip them to be future leaders. Our goal is to create pathways for fellows to continue organizing and we are excited to share that this year, two of our Student Power Fellows became team leads for the November General Election, leading a paid team in canvassing and phonebanking!





### Key Programs

#### **Budget Advocacy**

SF Rising was proud to help convene a People's Budget Coalition to fight for the resources our communities need to thrive. When the Mayor's budget plan proposed to cut \$120 million from workforce development for the unhoused, violence prevention, youth-enrichment programs and rent relief, we worked to keep the programs our communities need afloat.

What started off as a coalition of 30 groups at the beginning of the year, developed into over **150 groups**! The People's Budget Coalition organized 5 mass rallies with over 1,000+ attendees there to support community programs and demand that our voices are heard.

While we experienced a great loss, the People's Budget Coalition won back \$30 million of the proposed \$120 million cut. Without the work of the coalition, it wouldn't have been possible to win back the \$30 million, which can now go directly to the community, including children's services, after programs, legal services, workforce development, and violence protection.

We are celebrating our wins and look forward to continuing the fight for budget advocacy for our communities.



### Our Volunteers

- This year we welcomed **57 new volunteers**! Volunteers are a core part of our SF Rising community and we value the time and support they dedicate to our organization and collective vision.
- Through weekly volunteer orientations, we got folks familiar with SF Rising and the work that we do, and we learned about our volunteers and their interests. To inform and engage our volunteers, we held several political education events throughout the year! Our volunteers had a lot to contribute around the political landscape of SF and what we can do to build power. We hosted a **Political** (dis)Orientation 101 to educate volunteers about San Francisco's local government and the recent history of the Board of Supervisors and what actions need to be taken, and a **Political** (dis)Orientation: Criminal Justice Reform, where we went through a brief recap of what's happened recently with public safety and the fight for criminal justice reform in San Francisco. We aim to give power to our volunteers and inspire them through education and building connections.
- We are grateful for the volunteer support we had this year! Our volunteers helped out with events, tabling, registering voters, knocking on doors and phonebanking. A special shoutout to our super volunteers Mimi Klausner, Connie Tran, Tori Gibson, Rachel Gonzalez, Yves Chu, Brita Mackey, and Grace Yun!


